Our goal is to accelerate the efforts in the reduction of health inequities amongst and within countries.

EWEC-LAC is jointly led by its eight member agencies: Inter-American Development Bank, Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, Pan American Health Organization/World Health Organization, United Nations Population Fund, United Nations Children's Fund, US Agency for International Development, United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women, and the World Bank.

The movement is integrated by an Executive Management Committee, a Technical Secretariat and three working groups: Metrics and Monitoring; Communications and Advocacy; and Policies, Strategies and Interventions.

Overall objectives

Through effective partnerships with key regional, national and local stakeholders - governments, international development agencies, civil society representatives, academic institutions, the private sector and nongovernmental organizations - EWEC-LAC aims:

> To keep women's, children's and adolescents' health equity on top of the political and public agenda through regional, sub-regional, and national advocacy efforts towards the implementation of the Global Strategy in Latin America and the Caribbean.

• To promote country analysis of inequalities in women's, children's and adolescents' health, and support the monitoring of country progress towards reaching the targets set forth by the Global Strategy.

• To promote and strengthen country analysis of multisectoral determinants of health inequities, and the adoption and implementation of pro-equity health strategies.

Commitments to action

- Prioritize health equity so that no one is left behind.
- Eliminate all forms of violence, including violence against women and girls.
- Promote gender equality.
- Consider and respond to structural social determinants of health.
- Promote information systems disaggregated by vulnerability and other significant variables for the analysis of quality.
- Strengthen the cooperation between countries of the region.
- Prioritize equality.
- Include participatory accountability mechanisms.
